Course requirements

Students will write a paragraph suggesting discussion topics for each of the texts in the course; these will be presented in class on the first day each text is considered. Two papers are required; one will be a five page discussion of ethnicity in one of the Abraham Cahan short stories we are not reading for class. The second paper should be fifteen to twenty pages, will involve research, and must be comparative in nature, involving a text by an ethnic American writer and another from the home culture (i.e., European, Asian, African) of the writer in question. Class paragraphs will comprise 10% of the grade; the first paper 30%; the second paper 60%. Class participation will be considered in borderline cases.
